COUNCIL NEWS

Mayor and Council wish everyone a Happy New Year and hope your Christmas Holidays were memorable.

The new storage shelter for the Seniors' Bus has been built at the Public Works yard in Vermilion Bay. Unfortunately, Covid and other timing issues delayed delivery and construction of the shelter for over a year. The new shelter will help protect the bus from seasonal weather, enhancing the condition and life of the vehicle. As mentioned in the 2020 April Messenger, through our approved grant application to the Public Transit stream of the Investing in Canada Infrastructure Program (ICIP) the Federal and Provincial Governments funded approximately \$16,000 (38%) towards the shelter while Machin's portion was approximately \$25,800 (62%).

With an invitation to our Municipality from Ogichidaa Kavanaugh, our Mayor, Deputy Mayor and EDO participated in a Treaty#3 Leadership and Mayors Roundtable event held December 14th in Sioux Narrows. General topics discussed at the roundtable revolved around addictions in the territory as well as economic development and sharing of key projects. The roundtable was both informative and progressive for each community and territory that attended. We'd like to thank Treaty#3 for their invitation to this event, we look forward to any future joint projects that may arise.

Council members will be attending the annual Kenora District Municipal Association (KDMA) meetings, this year being held in Dryden on January 19th and 20th. KDMA is our collective regional voice to the provincial and federal governments in dealing with significant shared issues and concerns. We look forward to meeting in-person once again.

Council has received inquiries into the possibility of adding a Snow Boot/Gate to the Municipal grader to help reduce or eliminate heavy snow material being windrowed into driveways. This topic has been reviewed by Council on several occasions and more recently after the large snowfall in November, the answer is still no, it is not a fit for us. While there are positives to home owners in getting less snow at the end of their driveway there are also other considerations. The snow boot attaches to the end of the main grader blade, the same spot as the wing attaches. Therefore, only one can be attached at a time. Our Municipality maintains 12kms of hard surfaced roads and 77kms of gravel roads. When snowplowing equipment is deployed after a snowfall the grader and plow truck must clear as many roads as possible within a day. For our rural gravel roads, the grader needs to have the wing attachment on to move the windrow from the main blade further off of the shoulder of the road to maintain the roads width. With snow boots this is not

possible and roads become narrower which heightens safety concerns. It is hard to justify using a snow boot in some locations of our Municipality and not other areas. Snow boots will reduce the operational efficiency of the grader, less roads will get opened up at the end of the day, whose road should be left not cleared? Utilization of snow boots on equipment are better suited to community road networks versus rural roads.

Economic Development:

I hope everyone had a safe and happy holiday. As the new year begins, we hope to complete the projects we've started and seek out new opportunities. Our application to FCM for funding to complete a stormwater feasibility study was declined. It did meet their criteria, however they did not find the study to be innovative enough to receive funding. Although disappointed, we will still pursue other funding opportunities that can help with the stormwater issues we deal with.

In December we sent an application in to the Ontario Tril-

lium Foundation through the Resilient Communities Fund. For municipalities with a population of 20,000 or less the fund was aimed at improving active lifestyle services that were impacted from the COVID-19 pandemic. The Municipality applied for funding that would cover hiring a Recreational Facilitator on a one year contract as well as the funds to equip them with the materials they need. The facilitator would be responsible for delivering programs that were shut down from COVID-19 and starting new recreational programs in the community.

As many residents know, the Municipality has been in ongoing talks with the Ministry of Northern Development, Mines, Natural Resources and Forestry about acquiring Crown land. We were happy to have District Manager Ray Boudreau and District Planner Catherine Dashnay travel to the municipal office and discuss in more depth the current Machin projects. From these discussions we were informed we can begin the Feasibility Study for Ely Lake. Since the ministry requires a consultant or qualified professional to complete this expensive study, we will be seeking funding through programs to help with the costs.

Lastly, I'd like to thank the CO-OP board and staff members for beginning and putting together the Shop Local Pop -Up opportunities for small businesses. The Public Works Department would like to remind people that it is illegal to push snow onto and across roadways as stated in the Highway Traffic Act listed below.



The Highway Traffic Act R.S.O. 1990, C. H.8, S. 181 states: "No person shall deposit snow or ice on a roadway without permission in writing to do so from the Ministry or road authority responsible for maintenance of the road". The penalty on conviction is a fine of \$105.00.

This is a Door to Door Service – you do not have to worry about parking or walking. We drop you off right at the door of your medical appointment or essential shopping and return to pick you up.

The cost is **\$10.00 per person** to ride to and from Dryden on Tuesday or Thursday. Should you have mobility issues both getting on and off the bus or shopping and carrying your items, you will have to bring along a companion.

You do not have to be a senior to use this service. Any adult can ride, however seniors do come first for this service.

Covid-19 restrictions apply: Masks are mandatory, along with social distancing, and hand sanitizing on the bus. The Driver will explain this to you upon pick up.



Volunteer Commitment

The existence and effectiveness of Machin Volunteer Fire and First Response is reliant on local residents who volunteer and dedicate their time to train in fire and medical first response and to respond to emergencies in our municipality and surrounding unorganized regions at all hours.

Recently, two Machin firefighters have received recognition for their years of service to the community.

Tim Eady was awarded a 35 year service bar by the Ontario Fire Marshalls Office. Tim has been a valuable member of the department since 1985 as part of the Eagle River Fire Hall. Tim served a number of years as Deputy Fire Chief and remains a dedicated active firefighter that is an invaluable resource to all the other members of the department. He continues to keep various pieces of vital equipment in good operating condition ready for use at the Eagle River Fire Hall. His ongoing quiet commitment to the department led him to being recognized as Firefighter of the Year for 2021 (an annual award sponsored by Standard Insurance). We hope that he will remain a member for many years to come and continue to share his vast knowledge and experience with the rest of the department.

Rob Wisneski was awarded a 25 year service medal from the Ontario Fire Marshalls Office. Rob joined the department in 1996 and served as Fire Chief from 2002 to 2014. He continues in an active role as a Fire Captain and is helping to mentor his children who have both followed his example and joined the department. His years of training and experience are an asset to him in his role as a Captain and for providing advice and input to the current Fire Chief. We look forward to his continued involvement with the department, working with his family, and the rest of the department, as we serve the community.

These two members, as well as the rest of the volunteers, allow the Machin Volunteer Fire and First Response Department to be able to respond to the over 100 calls for service that are received annually to assist the community in medical emergencies, during fires and at motor vehicle collisions throughout our area.

Merry Christmas to all and to all a good night.





What is "EarlyON"?


